ACADEMIC BULLETIN DESCRIPTION

RETL 250 - Sustainability in Fashion and Retail

Examination of concepts, practices, and opportunities of fashion sustainability (such as social and environmental responsibility) available to designers, developers and consumers. (3 credits).

FULL COURSE DESCRIPTION

RETL 250: Sustainability in Fashion and Retail examines the challenges faced by designers, product developers, and consumers as they create, wear, and recycle clothing and fashion. Topics include (but are not limited to): the environmental impact of fast fashion, social responsibility, economic impact of textile and clothing recycling, technology and sustainable futures, and exploring healthy and clean fiber.

RETL 250: Sustainability in Fashion and Retail is an elective course for students in the Department of Retailing.

PREREQUISITES: None

LEARNING OUTCOMES

The students who successfully complete RETL 250 – Sustainability in Fashion and Retail will be able to:

- 1) analyze the sustainability challenges facing designers, product developers, and consumers;
- 2) identify the seven main forms of sustainable fashion consumption;

- 3) examine effective best practices of contemporary industry initiatives toward sustainability;
- 4) compare sustainability practices over the past twenty years for specific designers/companies. All learning outcomes in this Distributed Learning course are equivalent to those of a face-to-face (F2F) version of this course.

TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS

Adobe Presenter will be used for the online PowerPoint Lecture Presentations. To participate in learning activities and complete assignments, you will need:

- The ability to open Adobe documents and videos (e.g., YouTube);

- Computer skills that include using keyboard/mouse, accessing the Internet, sending/receiving email, and creating/saving/retrieving computer files.

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

All students will fulfill these requirements:

- Read all assigned chapters from the text and view all videos;
- Complete an introductory assignment;
- Complete ten (10) objective chapter quizzes;
- Answer end-of-chapter discussion questions;

- Participate meaningfully in two (2) online discussion forums, as assigned;
- Complete one (1) graded assignments;
- Take three (3) non-cumulative exams

Unless otherwise noted, assignments and exams are due by 10:00 pm Eastern Time on the date assigned or they are considered late and will not be accepted. If you are not in an EST zone, please calendar due dates/times accordingly.

SECURITY

Coursework is secured in blackboard with a username and password. Do not share your username and/or password with others. Do not access bb using unsecured wireless accounts.

INTRODUCTORY ASSIGNMENT (5% of final grade)

Each student will be required to complete an introductory assignment. The purpose of this assignment is to have the instructor become familiar with the student and for students to become acquainted with one another. As such, all information provided will be shared with your classmates. Instructions and a grading rubric are posted in Blackboard.

CHAPTER QUIZZES (10 @ 1%; 10% of final grade)

There will be ten (10) objective quizzes (1% each) based on chapter or video content. Specific instructions for these assignments are posted on Blackboard.

CHAPTER QUESTIONS (10 @ 1.5%; 15% of final grade)

Discussion questions are located at the end of each chapter. Students are required to answer assigned questions for most chapters of the textbook. Each chapter's set of questions is worth 1.5% of the final grade. Specific instructions for submitting answers are posted in Blackboard.

DISCUSSION FORUM POSTS (4 @ 5%; 20% of final grade)

Two (2) guided discussion forums will be posted on Bb. Students will respond to each by posting an initial discussion with their thoughts on the topic (5% per forum), and also a responsive post to one or more colleague's posts (5% per forum). Students will utilize readings and information that they collect from various online sources to inform their discussion. Respect and critical thinking will guide these discussions.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS (1 @ 20%; 20% of final grade)

In addition to other coursework, you will complete one written assignments (20%) which will be posted on Blackboard by the scheduled due date.

 In this assignment, you will research your favorite "green" fashion company citing clear examples of measurable steps taken by this company toward being environmentally friendly and socially responsible.

Instructions and a grading rubric is posted on Blackboard.

EXAMS (3 @ 10%; 30% of final grade)

There will be three (3) online exams (10% each). These assessments are based on the readings, lectures, and learning activities in each Learning Module, and will consist primarily of True/False and Multiple Choice questions. You will have a 24-hour period in which to access an exam, but once the exam is opened, you will have only one hour to complete it. Detailed instructions will be

provided through Blackboard. NOTE: Exam 3 is scheduled on the "Final Exam" date, but will not be cumulative.

EVALUATION AND GRADING SCALE

All assignment grading criteria/rubrics will be posted on Blackboard. There is a total of 100% possible for students in the course, broken down as follows:

- One (1) introductory assignment @ 5% = 5%
- Ten (10) chapter/video quizzes @ 1% each = 10%
- Ten (10) chapter questions @ 1.5% each = 15%
- Two (2) online discussion forums. Two initial posts @ 5% each plus two responsive posts
 @ 5% each = 20%
- One (1) written assignment @ 20% = 20% (as described above)
- Three (3) non-cumulative exams @ 10% each = 30%

GRADING

All grades will be posted on Blackboard.

Students are strongly encouraged to check their scores and cumulative points in Blackboard regularly.

Final grades are non-negotiable and are based on total percentage points earned (see chart).
